HALIFAX

Noni MacDonald is a Professor of Pediatrics at Dalhousie University with a clinical appointment in Pediatric Infectious Diseases at the IWK Health Centre in Halifax. She is a member of the Canadian Centre for Vaccinology, Halifax and is head of the Health Policy and Translation Group. Dr. MacDonald is the former Dean of Medicine at Dalhousie University. Her major research interests have included the microbiology of cystic fibrosis; stress management in medical faculty; sexually transmitted diseases in adolescents; and, vaccines for serious infectious diseases in children and youth. She is a consultant to the Department of Immunization, Vaccine and Biologicals of WHO since completion of her term on the World Health Organization's Global Advisory Committee on Vaccine Safety. Dr. MacDonald has long been recognized in Canada as an advocate for children and youth health and as a leader in pediatric infectious disease.

CHARLOTTETOWN

Lamont Sweet MDCM-McGill, 1967; Pediatric Specialty, Dalhousie, 1973 and Master Community Health and Epidemiology, UBC, 1985. Practiced as a Family Doctor, Pediatrician and Public Health Officer from 1969 until the present. Practice time was in either Newfoundland, Nova Scotia or Prince Edward Island. Has been a strong advocate of prevention of vaccine preventable diseases through immunization.

MONTREAL

Eduardo Franco is James McGill Professor in the Departments of Oncology and Epidemiology & Biostatistics, Director, Division of Cancer Epidemiology, and Interim Chair, Department of Oncology, at McGill University's Faculty of Medicine, in Montreal, Canada. He holds B.Sc. (1975) and Licentiate (1976) degrees in biology from Universidade de Campinas, Brazil, and master's (MPH) and doctoral (DrPH) degrees in public health microbiology from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill (1981-84). Professor Franco's research during the last 28 years has focussed on the following topics: molecular epidemiology and

prevention of cervical cancer and human papillomavirus-associated diseases, cancers of the upper aero-digestive tract, prostate, endometrium, and childhood tumours; studies of epidemiologic methods for evaluating efficacy of cancer screening strategies; the impact of measurement error in epidemiology; and studies of societal and clinical influences on cancer patient survival.

Zeev Rosberger Ph.D is the Associate Professor, Departments of Psychiatry and Oncology, McGill University. His research interests revolve around coping, communication, and risk information transmission in several populations and points along the cancer trajectory. Previous research has included randomized trials of a coping skills training intervention for breast, colon and other cancer patients and long term psychosocial outcomes (six and ten years follow-up). At present, he leads a number of funded research projects in Psychosocial Oncology. These include: psychosocial impact of infertility in men receiving chemotherapy for testicular and lymphatic cancers; impact of elevated genetic risk of cancer in the Ashkenazi Jewish Community; the role of knowledge and intentions in uptake of HPV screening for cervical cancer.

Marc Steben, MD, Medical Director, Clinique A and Medical Advisor at Institut National de Santé Publique du Quebec.

OTTAWA

Catherine Dubé, Clinical associate professor, Division of Gastroenterology, Department of Medicine, University of Ottawa. Dr. Dubé returns to Ottawa from the University of Calgary to join the Gastroenterology Division. As the Medical Lead for the Alberta Colorectal Cancer Screening Program (ACRCSP), she worked on the development of effective CRC screening programs throughout Alberta and on the implementation of the fecal immunochemical test (FIT) as the entry-level screening test for average risk individuals in that province. She was also the Medical Lead for quality assurance at the Forzani-MacPhail Colon Cancer Screening Center in Calgary. She has also participated in the Canadian Partnership Against Cancer (CPAC)'s Quality Determinants for CRC Screening Programs in Canada, published in 2009. Her current research activities as well as recent publications are related to the development of quality indicators for colonoscopy, to the understanding of the patients' perspective about endoscopy services, as well as the development of methods to engage primary care in CRC screening, and improving access to GI care.

KINGSTON

Harriet Richardson, BSc, MSc, PhD. After receiving a Master's Degree in Virology at the University of Québec, Dr. Richardson received a PhD in Epidemiology & Biostatistics at McGill University, where she studied the natural history of human papillomavirus infections and cervical neoplasia. She completed her postdoctoral fellowship with Dr. Kirstan Aronson (CCE Div.) in 2004, working on several projects devoted to assessing the relationship between exposure to suspected carcinogens (both environmental and occupational) and the risk of certain cancers, including breast and lung cancer. She is Associate Professor in the Department of Community Health & Epidemiology. In 2004, she

joined the National Cancer Institute of Canada - Clinical Trials Group where she is a senior investigator for clinical trials designed to evaluate the role of selected agents in chemoprevention.

TORONTO

Jeff Kwong, MD, MSc, CCFP FRCPC Scientist, Institute for Clinical Evaluative Sciences and Public Health Ontario; Family Physician, Toronto Western Hospital Family Health Team; Associate Professor, Department of Family & Community Medicine, Dalla Lana School of Public Health, University of Toronto, Dr. Kwong is an epidemiologist and health services researcher, a specialist in public health and preventive medicine, and a practicing academic family physician. His interests are in infectious diseases, particularly influenza and other vaccine-preventable diseases. His research lies at the interface between primary care and public health.

HAMILTON

Mark Loeb MD, FRCPC is Professor in the Departments of Pathology and Molecular Medicine and Clinical Epidemiology and Biostatistics, a medical microbiologist and infectious diseases specialist. He graduated from McGill Medical School in 1990 then completed fellowships in Internal Medicine, Infectious Diseases and Medical Microbiology at the University of Toronto and McMaster University, and an MSc in Clinical Epidemiology at McMaster. He holds the Michael G DeGroot Chair in Infectious Diseases Research and is Division Director for Infectious Diseases at McMaster. Dr. Loeb has led clinical trials on influenza vaccination and has served on national and international advisory committees on infectious diseases. His areas of research include vaccine preventable illness including influenza, pneumonia, as well as research on West Nile virus, dengue, and infections in the elderly. He also conducts genetic association studies on severity to infection. He holds funding from the Canadian Institutes of Health Research and from the U.S National Institutes of Health.

Fiona Smaill, MBChB, MSc, FRACP, FRCPC is professor and chair of the Department of Pathology and Molecular Medicine, a medical microbiologist for the Hamilton Regional Laboratory Medicine Program, and consultant in infectious diseases and infection control and co-director of the HIV clinic at Hamilton Health Sciences. After earning her medical degree at Otago University in New Zealand in 1978 and completing General Medicine training at Wellington Hospital, Dr. Smaill did residencies in Internal Medicine, Infectious Diseases, and Medical Microbiology at McMaster University and received her MSc in Design Measurement and Evaluation (Clinical Epidemiology) from McMaster University in 1989. Dr. Smaill is actively involved in clinical trials in HIV management, the development of vaccines for tuberculosis, and management of infections in pregnancy. She was a founding reviewer of the Cochrane Library and co-editor of the textbook "Evidence-Based Infectious Diseases".

SASKATOON

Anne Doig MD CCFP FCFP LLD (Hons) is a Former President of the Canadian Medical Association and has served her profession in many capacities, including long service also to the Saskatchewan Medical Association and the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Saskatchewan. A Family Physician in Saskatoon and a Clinical Associate Professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Saskatchewan, Dr. Doig has received the “Clinical Teacher of the Year in Family Medicine” by the medical house staff at Saskatoon City Hospital and was the Saskatchewan recipient of the “Excellence in Teaching Award” from the Association of Professors of Obstetrics and Gynecology. Dr. Doig is an original contributor to the ALARM (Advances in Labour and Risk Management) program of the Society of Obstetricians and Gynaecologists of Canada. Dr. Doig was also the Medical Advisor to the Population Health Division of the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency supporting the breast cancer screening program and assisting in the development and launch of the prevention program for cervical cancer and the screening program for colorectal cancer. In 2010, Dr. Doig received a Top 100 Most Powerful Women award from the Women’s Executive Network. Her medical colleagues in Saskatoon honored her in 2010 with an Exceptional Service Award to the Saskatoon Health Region, and in 2011 she was given an Award of Excellence from the College of Family Physicians of Canada. In 2012, Dr. Doig received a University of Saskatchewan Alumni Achievement Award. In 2013, she received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from the University of Saskatchewan.

EDMONTON

Alexander Doroshenko MD, MPH, FFPH(UK), FRCPC is an Assistant Professor in the Division of Preventive Medicine at the University of Alberta. After obtaining his medical degree, Dr. Doroshenko undertook further public health study in the United States. He is trained in pediatrics and public health medicine in the United Kingdom. He worked as a Medical Epidemiologist at the UK Health Protection Agency. From 2007 to 2009 Dr. Doroshenko was a fellow in Pediatric Infectious Diseases at the Center for Vaccinology, Dalhousie University. In 2010 he became the Provincial Medical Officer of Health in Communicable Disease Control in the Department of Health in New Brunswick. He joined the University of Alberta in May 2013. Senior Medical Director for Infection Prevention and Control for Alberta Health Services. He is currently President of the Association of Medical Microbiology and Infectious Diseases of Canada. His major interests are in the prevention of infectious diseases in both patients and health care workers in acute care hospitals.

David Scheifele OC, MD Professor, Pediatrics, UBC. Director, Vaccine Evaluation Center, B.C. Children's Hospital, Vancouver BC, Chair, Canadian Association for Immunization Research and Evaluation. Dr. Scheifele is recognized as a leading infectious diseases and vaccine expert in Canada. He has made substantial contributions to patient care, medical education, vaccine programs and vaccine research during his 35-year career as an academic clinician-scientist. He co-founded the Vaccine Evaluation Centre (VEC) at BC

Children's Hospital, the first academic vaccine research centre in Canada. As Director of the VEC, Dr. Scheifele leads a group of investigators who have completed over 225 studies to date, many contributing to the licensing of new vaccines, assessments of vaccine safety and the refinement of public immunization programs. Currently, Dr. Scheifele is the data centre chief for the Immunization Monitoring Program, Active (IMPACT), a program that monitors vaccine safety and preventable disease control at 12 pediatric centres across Canada. He is also a co-leader of the Public Health Agency of Canada / Canadian Institutes of Health Research Influenza Research Network, where he led the Rapid Trials group from 2009 to 2012. Dr. Scheifele is a Senior Clinician Scientist at the Child & Family Research Institute and a Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of British Columbia. An Officer of the Order of Canada, Dr. Scheifele has been recognized with many other awards and honours including the Outstanding Investigator award from the Child & Family Research Institute, the UBC Killam Prize for Teaching and the Alan Ross Award for Distinguished Career Achievement from the Canadian Paediatric Society.

Julie Bettinger, PhD, MPH. Dr. Bettinger is an Associate Professor at the Vaccine Evaluation Center in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of British Columbia and a Michael Smith Foundation for Health Research Scholar. Her research interests include vaccine safety and vaccine preventable diseases (specifically meningococcal and pneumococcal invasive infections), as well as attitudes and beliefs around immunization uptake and use. She is the epidemiologist for the Canadian Immunization Monitoring Program, Active (IMPACT), an active surveillance network for vaccine preventable diseases and vaccine adverse events in 12 tertiary care pediatric hospitals across Canada. She is the lead investigator for PCIRN's National Ambulatory Network that monitors the safety of influenza vaccines.
